What was life like for them?

Matilda was the daughter of King Henry I of England. She was the heir to the throne of England and her father married her to Henry V of France. In 1125 her husband died so her dad married her to Geoffrey Plantagenet, Count of Anjou. In 1135 her father died and instead of her becoming Queen of England her cousin, Stephen of Blois, claimed his uncle changed his mind on his death bed and saw Stephen as the successor because he was a man.

Why were they remarkable?

Rather than accept another man trying to tell her what her position in life should be Matilda took them on. She defeated, captured and imprisoned Stephen after the Battle of Lincoln.

Later Stephens forces cam back and captured Matilda in Oxford but by disguising herself as a corpse she managed to escape. Eventually Matilda agreed for Stephen to be King if he agreed that her sons would follow him. She did not win the Battle but she did win the War!

Why does their story resonate?

Their story resonates with us because sometimes we feel pressure to be something that we are told to be. Instead what we need to remember is that we should fight for what we believe is right, fair and just in the world. All of us will face people in life who want to achieve the things we want - but we will work harder and stronger to make sure we are the ones who get the rewards.

What was life like for them?

Eleanor was Queen of two great medieval powers - France and England. She was fierce. She stuck up for herself and her sons. Eleanor built up and ruled at court in Aquitaine which was regarded in her lifetime as the most intelligent court as well as giving advice about love and relationships. It is sometimes called the Court of Love.

At the time less than 10% of the population could read or write.

Why were they remarkable?



Why does their story resonate?



What was life like for them?



Abbess Hilda of Whitby

What was life like for them?

Hilda of Whitby, born in 614, was a noblewoman who became a powerful abbess and saint. After her baptism by Paulinus of York, she joined religious life, founding the double monastery of Whitby. Hilda was known for her wisdom, counsel, and promotion of education. She hosted the Synod of Whitby in 664, where crucial decisions were made about the church's practices. Renowned for her leadership and holiness, Hilda nurtured future church leaders, including Caedmon, the first English poet.

Why were they remarkable?

This was particularly true because at the time women were not seen to be the equals of men in the Catholic Church. To rise to such an important and prestigious position as a women was incredible – especially in the foundation of Lindisfarne as a centre of religious thought in the North East and in the pivotal role she played in the Synod of Whitby (664), which aligned English Christianity with Roman practices.

Why does their story resonate?

Their story resonates with us because Her wisdom and mentorship of many figures highlights the lasting importance of nurturing talent. Hilda's decisive role in the Synod of Whitby exemplified her commitment to unity and thoughtful governance. Her dedication to education, community, and faith continues to inspire, demonstrating how strong, wise, and compassionate leadership can leave an enduring legacy that transcends time and culture. For me it tells me that I can be a leader but also I can lead people how I want them to be led - not trying to imitate masculine characteristics.
